

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Kruger National Park & Waterberg – South Africa

Kruger National Park

The park is situated in northeastern South Africa and is one of Africa's largest game reserves in the world. Its high density of wild animals includes the Big 5: lions, leopards, rhinos, elephants and buffalos. Hundreds of other mammals make their home here, and diverse bird species such as vultures, eagles and storks.

Waterberg

Located near the majestic Waterberg Mountain Range in the Limpopo Province of South Africa. Away from the concrete, streets and bustle of people going to work every day, this region is known for its natural beauty, bushveld savannah and large animal population.

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Chobe National Park & Okavango Delta - Botswana

Chobe National Park

This park is in northern Botswana near the vast, inland Okavango Delta. It's known for its large herds of elephants and Cape buffalo, which converge along the Chobe Riverfront in the dry months. Lions, antelopes and hippos inhabit the woods and lagoons around Linyanti Marsh. The floodable grasslands of the Savuti Marsh attract numerous bird species, plus migrating zebras.

Okavango Delta

The Okavango Delta is a vast inland river delta in northern Botswana. It's known for its sprawling grassy plains, which flood seasonally, becoming a lush animal habitat. The Moremi Game Reserve occupies the east and central areas of the region. Here, dugout canoes are used to navigate past hippos, elephants and crocodiles. On dry land, wildlife includes lions, leopards, giraffes and rhinos.

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Moremi Game Reserve & Central Kalahari - Botswana

Moremi Game Reserve

It is a protected area in the eastern side of the Okavango Delta and was named after a Chief Moremi of the BaTswana tribe. The game reserve provides excellent views of savannah game as well as bird watching on the lagoons. Thick wooded areas provide sanctuary to the Cape wild dogs and leopards and a vast of wildlife such as Cape buffalo, giraffe, black rhino, lion elephant hippo, cheetah, hyena etc.

Central Kalahari

It is the second largest reserve in the world and covers an area of 52 000 square kilometres (larger than Netherlands). There are five reserves that was set aside as part of the Kgalagadi or Kalahari desert of Botswana and these are:


- Central Kalahari Game Reserve

- Kgalagadi Trans frontier Park


The land is mostly flat covered with bush and grass covering sand dunes, and areas of larger trees. Many of the rivers are fossiled with salt pans. The park is home to a diverse of wildlife such as Elephants, lions, white rhino, cape buffalo etc.

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Victoria Falls & Hwange National Park - Zimbabwe

Victoria Falls

Victoria Falls is one of the seven wonders of the world and is the largest waterfall on earth. It presents a spectacular sight of awe-inspiring beauty and grandeur on the Zambezi River, forming the border between Zambia and Zimbabwe. It was described by the Kololo tribe living in the area in the 1800s as 'Mosi-oa-Tunya' – 'The Smoke that Thunders'. Several hundreds millions cubic metres of water per minute falls over the edge, over a width of nearly 2kms, into a gorge of over hundred metres below. This creates a spectacular views of rainbow and 'smoke'.

Hwange National Park

One of Africa's top national parks, Hwange National Park in Zimbabwe's northwest should be on any safari lover's bucket list. Roaming Hwange's savanna grasslands and woodlands are the Big Five and have one of the biggest diversity of wildlife the world. The Belgium-sized park is also home to some 50 000 elephants and is known for regular sightings of cheetah, leopard and lion, as well as one of Africa's largest populations of the endangered wild dog and rare species such as rhino and sable.

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Lower Zambezi, South Luangwa & Kafue National Parks- Zambia

Lower Zambezi National Park

Very few places on earth offer the absolute freedom and untouched wilderness as the National Parks of Zambia in Southern Africa. Lower Zambezi, the first carbon neutral National Park in the world, provides a platform for unforgettable, unspoiled wildlife experiences on the banks of the mighty Zambezi River.

Kafue National Park

Found in the centre of western Zambia, Kafue National Park is the oldest and largest of Zambia's national parks. It covers a massive 22,400 km². First established as a National Park in the 1950's by the legendary Norman Car, Kafue is one of the largest national parks in the whole of Africa. Despite its size and prominent location only two hours drive from Livingstone, it remains little-known and largely unexplored with vast tracts of its virgin bush still untouched. Thanks to its size and variety of habitat types the Kafue holds a fantastic diversity of wildlife .


South Luangwa

The Luangwa River is the most intact major river system in Africa and is the life-blood of this 9059 km² Park. The Park hosts a wide variety of wildlife, birds and vegetation. The now famous 'walking safari' originated in this Park and is still one of the finest ways to experience Africa's pristine wilderness first-hand. The changing seasons add to the Park's richness, ranging from; dry, bare bushveld in the winter, to a lush, green wonderland in the summer months. There are 60 different animal species and over 400 different bird species in South Luangwa National Park. The only notable exception is the rhino, sadly poached to extinction.

Himba People

Down in the Kunene and Omusati regions of Northern Namibia, are the semi-nomadic people of Ovahimba and Ovazimba tribes. It is customary, for them, for the women to engage in daily activities of milking cows, taking care of the children while the men go hunting, sometimes leaving for long periods of time. With a population of over 50,000, the Himba are a polygamous people where Himba girls are married off to male partners selected by their fathers once they attain puberty.
